Athletic News by Sports Information Director/Public Relations, Mr. Tommy Wells Lady Rangers' Season Comes to an End

The Ranger College Lady Rangers saw their 2021 volleyball season come to a tough end on Friday in Hillsboro with a 3-2 loss to the Hill College Lady Rebels in the semifinals of the Northern Texas Junior College Athletic Conference Tournament.

Hill rallied from a 5-3 deficit in the fifth set to claim a 15-13 decision in the best-of-five match.

With the loss, Ranger finished its season with a 20-8 record.

The game marked the final appearance in an RC uniform for several of the Lady Rangers' stars, including Gloria Guerin, Ava Shmueli, Daycoria Meadows, Jasmin Garcia, Jamyah Anderson, Sakura Thomas, Aaliyah Hardy and Raelyn Theiss.

The Lady Rangers' 20 victories was a milestone for the RC program, marking only the second time in the volleyball team's history that a squad had reached the 20-win plateau. Ranger's best season came in 2018 when they went 23-12.

While the Lady Rangers were finishing their season, the Ranger College men's basketball team was getting its season started with a pair of road wins. Ranger got double-digit efforts from four players on Nov. 3 and rolled to a 81-75 win over Western Texas College in Snyder.

Eli Taylor led all RC scorers with 19 points. Tayton Conerway and Sofyane Nocara both added 14, while Jaylen Thompson chipped in 11.

On Nov. 14, Conerway came up big again for the Rangers, scoring 22 in the team's 95-87 win over Clarendon.

Wade Williams also reached double figures in the win by scoring 15. Martin Anguelov and Jared Clawson added 14 apiece.

The Rangers will make their home debut on Tuesday, Nov. 9, against Howard College. The men's game will start at 7 p.m.

The Lady Rangers will begin the doubleheader at 5 p.m.

Like the RC men's basketball team, the men's cross-country team enjoyed plenty of success this past weekend. The Rangers ran to third place in the Region V meet in Hobbs, New Mexico.

Christopher Santana, Shea Johnson and Kalil Bell led the RC squad. All three posted top 15 marks in the individual standings. Santana finished ninth overall, while Johnson and Bell raced their way to 13th and 15th, respectively.

The men's team will compete in the NJCAA national meet on Nov. 13 in Richmond, VA.

The RC women placed fourth at the Region V meet. Jessica Thomas-Billot was eighth in the women's 5-kilometer race. Madison Rowland and Alauna Stackhouse were 12th and 15th, respectively.
